After the July recess, the legislature has resumed its work. Last month, they held both appropriations meetings and interim sessions to kick off the second half of the year in preparation for the upcoming general session.

The Revenue and Taxation and Transportation committees are reviewing local option transportation taxes. The Wasatch Front Regional Council provided an overview of the tax allocations in each county, including a detailed breakdown of the various funding quarters.

### **AUGUST SPECIAL SESSION**

At the conclusion of the August interim meetings, the Legislature convened a Special Session and voted to place a constitutional question on the November ballot.

Constitutional Amendment D will read:

Should the Utah Constitution be changed to strengthen the initiative process by:

- Prohibiting foreign entities from influencing ballot initiatives and referendums.
- Clarifying the voters' and legislative bodies' ability to amend laws.

If approved, state law would also be changed to:

- Give Utahns 50% more time to gather signatures for a statewide referendum.
- Establish requirements for the legislature to follow the intent of a ballot initiative.
